6. What is a post poll alliance?
7. How was sworn in as Chief Minister of Karnataka?
8. Who is the Governor of Karnataka? Write a short note on his political background.
9. Why did the Congress party and JDS approach the Supreme Court?
10. What is the meaning of 'horse-trading' in politics?
11. In the past one year, state elections have been held in Manipur, Meghalaya and Goa. Who was the single largest party in these states? Which party formed the government in these states? Who are the governors of Meghalaya, Manipur and Goa?
